

SAN ANTONIO AREA FOUNDATION ANIMAL SERVICES PROGRAM SUMMARY - ACTIVITY AND FINANCIAL REPORT JANUARY - DECEMBER 2013

Overview

This document provides an update of community-wide goals for the no-kill effort and grants awarded from Area Foundation funds that help achieve the no-kill goal.

Numeric and percent of intake goals in the 2013 Goal column for Rescue Groups, Comprehensive Adoption Programs, Pet Retention and Compassionate Director are based on actual intake of animals at the Animal Care Services shelter. Numeric goals for Feral Cat TNR Program and High-Volume, Low-Cost Spay/Neuter are based on the estimated number of sterilizations needed to achieve zero stray and free-roaming animal population growth.

Animal No-Kill Awareness Campaign—Talk About It!

The Animal No-Kill program of the San Antonio Area Foundation, Talk About It!, is continuing in 2014.

- We continue to produce materials that are used in outreach events and in grassroots activities by animal welfare organizations.
- Talk About It! has an active social media campaign with over 7,000 friends and followers on Facebook and Twitter.
- Talk About It! organized or participated in the San Antonio Rampage Pucks and Paws, Texas Public Radio Silver Solutions, San Antonio Silver Stars Hoops and Hounds, Movie Night for International Homeless Pets Day, No-kill Community Conversation with Mike Arms, adoption events at Ranger Creek Brewing & Distilling and The Cove Restaurant, Howliday Party for Blue Buffalo Homes 4 the Holidays, and the animal welfare appreciation luncheon.

Bark in the Park/Perrito Grito Grassroots Pet Event to Promote Care. Adopt. Neuter.

Talk About It! held the 2nd Bark in the Park/Perrito Grito event at Woodlawn Lake Park in March 2013.

- Over 5,000 people attended.
- 800 low-cost vaccinations (350 pets), 91 spay/neuter surgeries, and 48 adoptions.
- 42 exhibitors, live music by Las Altenas and The Krayolas, pet contests with celebrity judges (human and canine).
- 350 volunteers assisted including lefferson High School, Kym's Kids, Americorp, Texas MedClinic, and the Salvation Army.
- The event was co-hosted by Councilman Cris Medina, District 7 and emceed by Colleen Quirk and Tim Derk.




Alamo Area Partners for Animal Welfare (AAPAW)

AAPAW held 12 adoption events in 2013 and had 82 dogs and cats adopted. They also provided 26 spay/neuter surgeries for rescued

Transports

<u>Alamo Rescue Friends</u> conducted seven transports in 2013 with a total of 227 dogs relocated out of state where the number of adopters is greater than the number of local dogs available for adoption. Over 30,000 miles!

Homer was confiscated from a home in San Antonio as part of a cruelty case. He'd spent the first four years of his life neglected and living among feces and urine, which caused skin problems and irritated his feet. When Homer joined the Alamo Rescue Friends program in October of 2013, he required major dental work and treatment for his skin issues. And he needed to learn that people can be kind. Thanks to the love of his foster mom and medical care made possible by ARF's donors, Homer flourished. By Halloween, he had distinguished himself as a lap dog who loves belly rubs and has a knack for stealing socks. Homer joined ARF's transport in November and on the day after Thanksgiving, he was adopted by a family of his very own.



<u>Tracy's Dogs</u> conducted 15 transports in 2013 with a total of 479 dogs adopted or transferred out of state.
