

SAN ANTONIO AREA FOUNDATION ANIMAL SERVICES PROGRAM SUMMARY - ACTIVITY AND FINANCIAL REPORT JANUARY - DECEMBER 2014

Overview

This document provides an update of community-wide goals for the no-kill effort and grants awarded from Area Foundation funds that help achieve the no-kill goal.

Numeric and percent of intake goals in the 2014 Goal column for Rescue Groups, Comprehensive Adoption Programs, Pet Retention and Compassionate Director are based on actual intake of animals at the Animal Care Services shelter. Numeric goals for Feral Cat TNR Program and High-Volume, Low-Cost Spay/Neuter are based on the estimated number of sterilizations needed to achieve zero stray and free-roaming animal population growth.

Intake and Summary Notes	No-kill is defined as the live release of all healthy, treatable and adoptable dogs and cats. Using medical and behavioral standards defined by all San Antonio shelters, 13% of the animals that enter the ACS shelter were categorized as "unhealthy and untreatable" in 2014. 87% of the animals brought into the shelter were healthy, treatable, and adoptable. This is a 6% increase over 2013. Animal No-Kill Awareness Campaign—Talk About It!

- The Animal No-Kill program of the San Antonio Area Foundation, Talk About It!, has continued in 2014. See: www.TalkAboutltSA.org.
- We produce brochures—in English and Spanish—and other materials that are used in outreach events and in grassroots activities.
- Talk About It! has an active social media campaign with 9,000 friends and followers on Facebook and Twitter. Also, Talk About It! organized or participated in the San Antonio Rampage Pucks and Paws, San Antonio Stars Hoops and Hounds, grand opening of community garden and dog park at Summit Oaks Apartments; the No-kill Community Conversation and Workshop with Amy Mills, Myles Chandler and Matt Piccone of Emancipet; and adoption events at Ranger Creek Brewing, Texas Public Radio Silver Solutions, Special Needs make EXTRA Special Pets at Paw Basics, Back to School/Back to Cool at Kirby Animal Shelter and the Home 4 the Holidays Howliday Party.

Bark in the Park/Perrito Grito Grassroots Pet Event to Promote Care. Adopt. Neuter. Talk About It! held the 3rd Bark in the Park—Perrito Grito event at Woodlawn Lake Park in March 2014.

- 5,000 people attended. Pets received 340 low-cost vaccinations, 65 spay/neuter surgeries, and 68 were adopted.
- Activities included: 50 exhibitors, live music by the Network for Young Artists and Los #3 Dinners, and pet contests with celebrity judges (human and canine). 150 volunteers assisted including Kym's Kids, UTSA VOICES, Texas MedClinic, and the Salvation Army.
- The event was co-hosted by Councilman Cris Medina, District 7 and emceed by Colleen Quirk and Tim Derk.



Alamo Area Partners for Animal Welfare (AAPAW)





AAPAW had 119 dogs and cats adopted in 2014, including 15 at the San Antonio Rampage "Pucks and Paws" hockey game in Q1 and 25 at the Howliday Party in Q4. They have also provided 80 spay/neuter surgeries for their members' rescued pets and have provided 62 heartworm treatments. They had their Ist Annual Adopt-A-Thon at Woof Gang Bakery in Q2.





Alamo Rescue Friends conducted ten transports in 2014, including its inaugural rescue flight which took place in February. 393 dogs were transported out of state to areas where the number of local adopters is greater than the number of dogs available for adoption.

ARF rescued Fiona and her family in February of 2014. She was impounded at Animal Care Services with a broken jaw, was heartworm positive, and was caring for her nine puppies. Fiona's puppies traveled to New England with ARF in May of 2014 and were each adopted, but Fiona stayed behind to get healthy enough to travel. After undergoing surgery and heartworm treatments, Fiona was finally ready to follow in her puppies' paw prints. In November she made her own journey to a new beginning in New England. Her new name is Kelly and her adoptive mom writes, "She is very friendly and sociable and we love her very much. We are thankful that we got such a wonderful new friend and companion."



Tracy's Dogs conducted 16 transports in 2014 with a total of 708 dogs adopted.



Poppy is a senior Shih Tzu mix who found herself at Animal Care Services in very poor condition. She was overlooked and had no takers. During a regular trip through ACS, a kennel worker approached Tracy telling her about this sweet, wonderful, mild-mannered dog whom no one wanted. TracysDogs found her inner beauty below all those physical ailments. Poppy went to a wonderful foster who nursed her back to health, and soon thereafter, a loving and accepting family was found in Pennsylvania who loves Poppy dearly. She is happy, healthy, and now part of a wonderful family.
